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High Horses Schooling Show Rules, Policies, and Notes:

- Negative coggins test and proof of rabies vaccination within 12 months required for all horses. Please send with entry.
- All classes will award ribbons 1st-6th place.
- Formal attire and braiding is encouraged but not required. Horse and rider tack/attire should be clean and tidy with good fit. Riders in all classes, and anywhere on the show grounds, must wear ASTM/SEI headgear. Harness must be secure and properly fitted. Any rider violating this rule at any time must immediately be prohibited from further riding until such headgear is properly in place. The show management strongly encourages all riders to wear protective headgear passing or surpassing current application ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials) SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards and harness secured while riding anywhere on the competition grounds.
- Show management reserves the right to cancel, combine, or split classes as entries warrant, and change the show schedule as it deems necessary.
- Vet and farrier will be on call, EMT on-grounds
- Horses may only be ridden by those who have signed the appropriate entry blank.
- Rider is responsible for reading and understanding class specifications. Please contact Sue at 802-763-3280 with any questions.
- USEF rules will be used as guidelines for all areas not specifically addressed in rules or class specifications. Please see www.usef.org
- Refunds: Prior to closing date, all entries refunded less \$30.00 scratch fee. There are no refunds on dressage entry fees after the closing date. For all non-dressage classes, there is no charge to add or scratch classes before the class begins. Scratches not accepted after the start of a class.
- Stabling: Contact GMHA at (802) 457-1509 for more details.

Class Specifications:

Grooming and Showmanship: Open to all horses and ponies. To be judged on the competitor's ability to properly groom and prepare the horse to be judged, and their showmanship performance during the class. To be shown on the lead (halter and leadrope or bridle acceptable); no other tack or equipment allowed. Exhibitor will show the horse in a pattern (posted before class) and in a line-up.

Leadline: Open to riders age 9 and under. To be shown at the walk, with short trot/jog. Not to cross-enter into any non-leadline class.

Equitation: To be shown at the walk, trot/jog, canter/lope both ways of the ring. To be judged on hands, seat, and control of mount. May be asked to back.

Pleasure: To be shown at the walk, trot/jog, or canter/lope both ways of the ring. May be asked to back. To be judged on performance, manners, soundness, and the horse/pony's suitability to serve as a pleasure mount.

Open: Open to riders of all seats: To be shown at the walk, trot/jog, canter/lope both ways of the ring.

Beginner: Open to riders 12 years of age and under who have not competed in any class requiring canter. To be asked to walk and trot/jog ONLY both ways of the ring. May not cross-enter into any class requiring canter.

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Advanced Beginner: Open to all riders – MAY NOT CROSS ENTER into any other equitation division, or class requiring a canter in a full group. Riders to show at the walk, trot/jog, and to canter/lope one at a time or in a small group.

Hunter Hack 18': To be shown at the walk, trot and canter both ways of the ring. Also to be shown individually over two simple fences not to exceed 18". To be judged on performance, soundness, and the suitability of the horse to be a hunter.

Equitation Divisions:

Short/Long Stirrup: Open to riders 12 years of age and under (Short Stirrup) or riders 13 years of age or older (Long Stirrup) who have not competed over 2'3" – MAY BE SPLIT IF ENTRIES WARRANT. May not cross-enter into other equitation division, or any classes with fences exceeding 2'. Pleasure & Equitation to be shown at the walk, trot and canter on the flat-no more than 8 riders to canter at one time. Course to consist of 8 cross-rails not to exceed 18". Simple changes acceptable.

Jr/Adult Novice: Open to all junior and adult amateur riders not showing above 2'3" at this show. MAY BE SPLIT IF ENTRIES WARRANT. May not cross-enter into other equitation divisions, or any classes with fences exceeding 2'3". Pleasure & Equitation to be shown at the walk, trot, & canter on the flat-no more than 8 riders to canter at one time. Course to consist of 8 verticals not to exceed 2'3". Simple changes acceptable.

Jumper Classes:

Table II, 1: Fastest clear round wins the class. No jump off.

Table II, 2b: Rounds with no faults (jumping or time) stay in the ring after completing the course. When the judge signals, rider immediately begins jump off round.

Puddle Jumper: Open to all riders. May not cross-enter into any class where fences exceed 2'6" at the same show. Fences not to exceed 2'3".

Elementary Jumper: Open to all riders. May not cross-enter into any class where fences exceed 3' at the same show. Fences not to exceed 2'9".

Schooling Jumper: Open to all riders. Fences not to exceed 3'.

Low Jumper: Open to all riders. Fences not to exceed 3'3".

Open Jumper: Open to all riders. Fences not to exceed 3'6".

Fun and Games:

Simon Says: Judged on the horse and rider's ability to follow the announcer's instructions. Judge calls out commands (change of gait, directions, halt, reinback, etc...), exhibitor must obey commands only IF "Simon Says". Class continues until one horse remains. Commands appropriate to the level for each class.

Trail Class: To be shown individually over a course of 6-8 obstacles (may include mailbox, bridge, backing over rails, cones, small jump, water crossing). Map will be posted prior to class.

Beginner/Leadline Trail Class: Open to beginner riders of all ages. Leadline acceptable for all or a portion of trail course. To be shown individually over a course of 6-8 trail obstacles (may include mailbox, bridge, backing over rails, cones, small jump). Map will be posted prior to class.

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Fundraising Ideas!

1. **Help Squad.** List available youth services such as raking, child care, cleaning, dog walking, or something more specific. Set time blocks on SignUpGenius. Pair up kids with appropriate tasks, fan out and earn cash.
2. **Magic Show.** There are great faith-based illusionists out there. Teach each child in your group a magic trick that they can perform and sell tickets to the show!
3. **Movie Night.** Tickets can be all-inclusive or you can add to the money you make by setting up a concession stand. Make sure you have the appropriate copyright permissions. Have volunteers sign up for concession contributions as well as job time slots.
4. **Cookie Party.** You provide the supplies; participants provide the creativity.
5. **Gingerbread House Kit.** Put supplies (graham crackers, icing, gumdrops, etc.) in a cute bag, tied with a ribbon. Now, purchasers can even re-gift it!
6. **Retro Game Night.** Who plays games anymore? I mean those that aren't on a screen. Collect donated prizes from local businesses and charge an entry fee. Bring on the family fun!
7. **Child Care.** Provide two hours of fun and activities for kids while parents have date night, or just some quiet time.
8. **Holiday Child Care.** For a twist on the child-care idea, schedule it two weeks before the holiday to give parents time to shop. Help kids make a crafty gift that they can give to parents.
9. **Gift Wrapping.** Snag business from parents who are picking up after your Holiday Child Care or from people who just don't like wrapping presents!
10. **Jail.** Create warrants, make the "arrests," and collect bail money. There are so many creative marketing angles for this one!
11. **Iron Chef.** Recruit church leaders to judge a formal smoothie making competition. Give it a spin by selecting a secret ingredient participants MUST include.
12. **Auction.** Hold an online or traditional auction by collecting donation items from church members or local businesses.
13. **Ornament Sale.** Have your group design just one special ornament to sell each year.
14. **Dough for Dough.** Make two or three types of cookie dough to sell. Now you've made it easy to have fresh cookies any time of year.
15. **Play It Again.** Collect used sports equipment to sell. Clean and fix it if needed. Donate any equipment left at the end of the sale to local sports programs.
16. **Sports Photography.** All the world is a photographer now with a smart phone. Charge a flat fee to take photos of their little star, while they get to watch the game.
17. **Lollipops.** Sell lollipops at Silent Saturday sports events. Check with your church or local sports leagues. Most have a day for spectators to watch, not speak. Lollipops are popular on the sidelines on these days.
18. **Portraits.** Do you have an artist or two in the bunch? Sell drawings or caricatures of children. They can be done from photos or live sittings, if your artist is fast. Use SignUpGenius to schedule time before and after a worship service when little ones will be nicely dressed.
19. **Dinner Service.** Make dinners or sell BBQ on a Friday night – when no one wants to cook. Schedule the pick-up from 4-6pm, on the way home from work and activities. Deliver for an extra fee since that is a true luxury.
20. **Raffle.** 50/50 is the easiest. The winner gets half and your group keeps the other half.



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21. **Auction, part deux.** Be creative. This time auction off services.
22. **Craft Fair.** Church members can contribute items, too, but proceeds support your goal.
23. **Joke-a-thon.** Get pledges for how many jokes are told in a 1-hour timeframe. You decide if they have to be funny! Charge an entry fee for the hour of entertainment.
24. **Pie in the Eye.** Sell chances to be the one who hits your youth leader with a pie.
25. **Pooper Scoopers.** Sure, no one wants to do it, but they'll pay for it! That's why you can charge a premium.
26. **Bingo.** It's not just for the retirees! Make it a family night. Sell slices of pizza and make it dinner, too.
27. **Flowers.** A single bloom is easy and often more meaningful. Take pre-orders on a sign up, and schedule to deliver on Mother's Day!
28. **Wedding Assistance.** There are so many details. Check the church schedule and offer your services on the big day or for set-up the day before.
29. **Car Wash.** Vacuum the inside, too. Oh, and yes, you do windows!
30. **Cake Pop Bake Sale.** Small and easy to sell. Have a unique theme and sell multiple times throughout the year. People will look forward to buying your treat. How about local NFL colors, shamrocks or ghosts?
31. **Holiday Wreaths and Greenery.** Make your own or buy in bulk and resell. Sell complimentary items such as bows or wreath hooks too.
32. **3-Club Golf Tournament.** Three clubs, 18 holes, three hours. Accept pledges for birdies. Add an age-based putting contest, so even non-golfers can participate.
33. **Cookbook.** No need to print this anymore. Sell access to your digital version. Have contributors sign up online. Be sure to have them add their recipe title in the comments section of SignUpGenius, so you don't end up with 20 chicken casserole recipes.
34. **Kids Cookbook.** Create a version with simple recipes that the 5-12-year-olds can pull off without assistance.
35. **Candy Jar.** Guess the number of jellybeans, hair ties, bouncy balls, etc. in the jar to win.
36. **Polar Bear Plunge.** Dare to do more than dip your toes in the icy water, all while raising money for your worthwhile cause!
37. **Chuck-a-Duck.** Paint a large target on a tarp. Sell rubber ducks that participants decorate. Closest to the bulls eye wins. Create brackets or make it a double elimination event.
38. **Dodge Ball Tournament.** What used to be gym class torture is now beloved by many. There are opportunities to charge for team entry fee, spectator tickets, concessions, and sponsorships. This could grow every year!
39. **Caroling for Cash.** Sure it's fun to carol for goodwill, but accept tips for your cause this year.
40. **Pet Parade.** Charge an entry fee. Ribbons go to Best Dressed, Biggest, Smallest, even Best Smile.
